## **Course Description:**

This course provides an analysis of ethics in the helping professions, application of professional ethical codes, and decision-making models when standards are in conflict. The course will present ethical problems faced by professionals and will critically examine the decision making process.

## **Course Competencies:**

Upon completion of the course, the student should be able to:

- Describe the ethical standards and values in various helping professions codes, including the National Association of Social Workers Code of Ethics and the National Organization of Human Services Code of Ethics.
- 2. Distinguish between personal and professional values and explain the impact of each related to the helping professions.
- 3. Describe the importance of ethical standards in the human services profession.
- 4. Give examples of how ethical standards may conflict when working in the field.
- 5. Apply decision making models to ethical dilemmas.
- 6. Analyze and critique ethical decisions from a decision making model framework.
- 7. Apply ethical standards and decision making models in workplace settings.

### Guidelines for Requesting Accommodations Based on Documented Disability or Medical Condition
